## Severe Weather Outlook Northeast

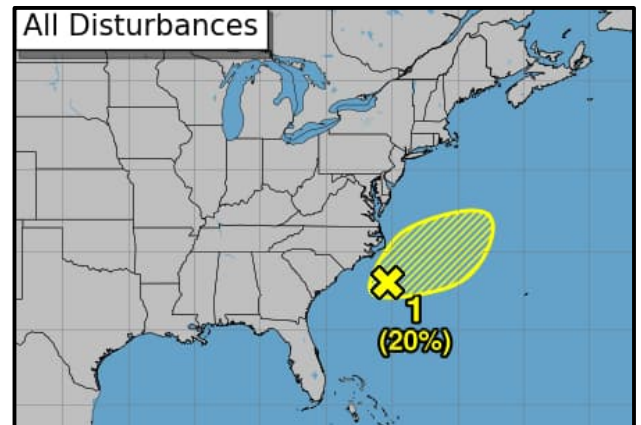
- Thunderstorms will likely erupt across the Northeast later Friday as a strong cold-front plows through the region.
- The heat and seasonably humid air in place will provide the atmospheric energy needed for storms to grow and strengthen.
- As surface temperatures warm, thunderstorms will likely form in the higher terrain around midday before moving eastward through the afternoon.
- Boston is inside a Level 2 out of 5 threat for severe weather, according to NOAA's Storm Prediction Center, but New York City, Philadelphia, Baltimore and Washington, D.C. are just outside that zone in a Level 1 risk.
- As storms initially develop, large hail will be the main risk before the threat increases for 60-plus mph winds as the storms reach the I-95 corridor. In addition, a spin up of a tornado cannot be ruled out.



## Tropical Activity

### Atlantic – Disturbance 1

- A tropical rainstorm that has been bringing heavy rain and flooding to Florida will emerge over the Atlantic Ocean off the Southeast coast.
- As of Thursday afternoon, locally up to 20 inches of rain had already fallen over parts of South Florida.
- A rich flow of moisture trailing the center of the rainstorm can bring several more inches of rain to gauges across the state's central and southern peninsula in the coming days.
- "There is a low chance the rainstorm will develop and organize further through Saturday as it moves northeastward away from the U.S. East Coast," said AccuWeather Senior Meteorologist Dan Pydynowski.
- The overall steering pattern is such that any development would then move east out over the open Atlantic waters, limiting the threat to the U.S. or any other land masses.



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## Atlantic – Disturbance 2

- The first tropical system of the 2024 Atlantic hurricane season will likely soon take shape with several areas showing signs of potential development in the coming days.
- One expected to move into the Gulf of Mexico early next week has a decent chance of becoming the first tropical depression or named storm of the season.
- There will be a narrow window of both time and space for a tropical system to form.
- "The main limiting factor for development will be the close proximity to land and limited time over water," added Douty. "Despite these limitations, it looks increasingly likely that a tropical depression or storm can develop."
- "Regardless of how strong this potential tropical system can get, heavy rain is expected to be the most significant impact," said AccuWeather Senior Meteorologist Adam Douty.
- Tropical moisture preceding any tropical development will reach across eastern Mexico and even north into Texas and Louisiana as early as Sunday.
