Tropical Outlook

- AccuWeather meteorologists are closely monitoring the Atlantic basin for the potential that two named storms could develop in the coming weeks.
- The Atlantic hurricane season is barely more than a week old at this point, but conditions are coming together in a way that could enable the formation of two storms, each in very different areas of the basin.
- Forecasters have pegged an area over the Gulf of Mexico as well as another area near Central
 - America over the western Caribbean Sea along with a stretch over the waters off the East Coast of the United States, near the Carolinas, as the potential trouble spots.
- Any disturbance that may develop off the East Coast is likely to head out to sea regardless of
 whether it strengthens into a tropical system or not. However, if a tropical system forms near
 Central America or southern Mexico, there's a chance it could wander northward toward the
 U.S. Gulf Coast, a part of the country that has been left vulnerable to flooding due to excessive
 rainfall in recent weeks.
- Waters over the western and central Gulf of Mexico and the northwestern Caribbean Sea are approaching 85 degrees, which is sufficiently warm to support a tropical system and allow for anything that might develop to gain in strength.
- AccuWeather forecasters advise anyone along the Gulf Coast to monitor the situation in the
 days ahead. Areas of coastal Texas and Louisiana may be especially vulnerable to flooding
 should an onslaught of heavy rain produced by a tropical system during the third week of June
 materialize.
- As for the area off the East Coast of the U.S., a front forecast to push southward from New England at the end of the week is expected to stall over an area covering parts of the Southeastern states and offshore waters in the west-central Atlantic.
- The next two names on the list of tropical storms for the 2021 season are Bill and Claudette.
- Ana, the first name on the list for this year, developed on May 22 and dissipated over the central Atlantic on May 24.






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Wildfire Activity

Arizona - Telegraph Fire

- The Telegraph Fire has consumed more than 84,860 acres and is at 34% containment as of Wednesday evening, according to a video update on the Telegraph Fire Information Facebook page.
- Fire crews on Wednesday focused on the Highway 60 corridor as they continued working to contain the fire in preparation for the future reopening of travel, according to the information page.
- The area of Signal and Pinal peaks burned most actively through Tuesday night, and crews spent the night extinguishing fire in areas around structures, according to the information page.
- Five structures were reported burned over, though it was not clear what they were.
- The fire was initially reported on June 4, south of Superior. It has consumed more than 8,600 acres since Tuesday night and is now the tenth largest wildfire in Arizona history.
- Though the cause of the fire is still under investigation, it was most likely human-caused, according to the fire information page.
- More than 750 fire personnel are still at the scene and fighting the blaze, according to InciWeb.
- Mandatory evacuations remain in place for at least 2,500 residences in Gila County.
- Governor Doug Ducey issued two Declarations of Emergency in response to the Telegraph and Mescal Fires in Pinal and Gila Counties, making available up to \$400,000 for response efforts.
