

Flood Activity Washington

- Crews across western Washington are shifting from emergency rescues to damage assessment and recovery after days of historic flooding, even as forecasters warn another storm system could bring renewed risks in the days ahead.
- In Snohomish County, firefighters and rescue teams spent much of the week responding to flooded

roads and neighborhoods, rescuing dozens of people trapped by rapidly rising water.



- Floodwaters along the Skykomish River near Monroe have begun to recede, but authorities cautioned that risks remain.
- Farther north in Skagit County, leaders said Mount Vernon's flood wall protected downtown during peak river levels, sparing hundreds of buildings near the Skagit River. Still, officials said some residents remain displaced and recovery is far from complete.
- The National Weather Service said another atmospheric river is expected to move into the region, bringing additional rainfall and significantly stronger winds. Reid Wolcott, a warning coordination meteorologist with the agency, said the next system could deliver 4 to 7 inches of rain to mountain headwaters, potentially pushing rivers back to moderate flood stage and, in higherend scenarios, near recent crest levels.
- On Saturday morning, local, state and federal elected officials, including Gov. Bob Ferguson, U.S. Sens. Maria Cantwell and Patty Murray and U.S. Reps. Suzan DelBene and Kim Schrier, surveyed the aftermath.
- The flooding, while still historic, mercifully didn't quite reach the extreme levels initially predicted. No deaths or significant injuries have been reported, Ferguson said.
- Some relief from the federal government has arrived in Washington, said Ferguson.
- President Donald Trump on Friday signed an emergency declaration to give the state federal aid to respond to the flooding. Federal personnel are working with local authorities on rescuing stranded people, clearing debris from roads and other emergent needs, the governor said.
- Assessing the damage to get further federal aid for the recovery will come later. Unlocking that
 additional support, including assistance for individuals, will require the feds to approve a disaster declaration.
