Tropical Activity Atlantic – Disturbance 1

- A broad trough of low pressure is expected to develop over the southwestern Caribbean Sea during the next day or two.
- Significant development of this system appears unlikely as it drifts west-northwestward or northwestward toward Central America.
- 48-hour formation chance: Low (near 0%)
- 5-day formation chance: Low (10%)



Flood Activity

Arkansas

- Torrential rainfall in Southeast Arkansas late Monday and today has damaged homes and businesses, and closed roads in the Monticello-McGehee-Dumas-Star City area.
- The National Weather Service in Little Rock said Tuesday afternoon that between 10 and 15 inches of rain had fallen in parts of Arkansas, Desha, Drew and Lincoln counties since the storm began.
- A flash flood warning was in effect for more anticipated rainfall.
- One of the hardest places hit was Dumas in Desha County. The city received more than 10 inches of rain in less than one day, and a very rare flash flooding emergency was issued.
- Dumas emergency officials say more than 50 homes across the city had water in them. The hardest-hit areas were near the main ditches.

Mississippi

- Severe weather and flash flooding prompted voluntary evacuations and local road closures are in effect across northern Mississippi.
- 150 homes have been impacted, mostly in Bolivar County and 60+ roadways are flooded, in Panola, Sunflower, and Bolivar Counties.

Wildfire Activity

<u>California</u>


- Firefighters worked through the night to contain a fast-moving wildfire that broke out Tuesday afternoon in Yuba County, California, and moved toward a nearby U.S. Air Force base.
- The blaze, named the Intanko Fire, had spread over more than a square mile by late Tuesday. It damaged at least two buildings, YubaNet Fire News reported.
- It started near Camp Far West Lake in Wheatland, about 36 miles north of Sacramento. Some residents there were told to evacuate, as were those living in military housing on Beale Air Force Base, according to the Yuba County Sheriff.
- All evacuation orders were lifted by 7:30 p.m.

Arizona

- A wildfire that has burned nearly 120 square miles in central Arizona has destroyed two homes and three outbuildings as it continues to spread.
- More than 750 firefighters are battling the Telegraph Fire, which was first detected on Friday. It was only 18% contained late Tuesday. The cause is being investigated.
- McAlister said it is the ninth largest wildfire in state history, the Arizona Republic reported.
- Evacuation orders remain in place for several communities in Gila and Pinal counties, including in Top-of-the-World, the Miami area west of the town limits, Miami south of U.S. Highway 60 from Dairy Canyon to Mackey's Camp, Oak Flat Campground, and Oaks Mobile Home and RV Park.



- Several other areas, including Superior, the rest of Miami, Claypool and parts of Central Heights and Cobre Valley Regional Medical Center, have been told to be ready to go at a moment's notice.
- The evacuations include at least 2,500 homes in Gila County, Carl Melford, the county emergency manager, told The Associated Press.
- New evacuations were ordered Tuesday for the Mescal Fire, a second large wildfire burning several miles from the Telegraph Fire.
- The San Carlos Apache Tribe issued a "Go" notification for T11 Ranch and Beverly Hills areas south of State Highway 70. The community of East El Capitan remained under an evacuation order.
- The Mescal Fire, burning southeast of Globe, Arizona, had consumed nearly 103 square miles as of late Tuesday, according to Inciweb. It was 23% contained. The Mescal Fire began June 1, and its cause is under investigation.
