

Tropical Activity Atlantic – Invest 92L

- A small area of low pressure located 150 miles east-southeast of Jacksonville, Florida continues to produce a concentrated area of showers and thunderstorms Friday morning but has yet to make clear if it has a well-defined surface circulation.
- Currently moving west northwestward at 10-15 mph and will approach the northeastern coast of Florida or the Georgia coast early Friday.
- "Even if the circulation gets a little stronger, it's going to want to pull in more dry air," said FOX Weather Hurricane Specialist Bryan Norcross.
- "And that's going to inhibit its development and that's one of the reasons we don't think it will
 quickly strengthen or even has much of a chance of being very strong by the time it gets to the
 coast."

Atlantic - Disturbance 2

- A broad area of low pressure is forecast to develop on Friday over southeastern Mexico and northern Central America.
- The NHC said that environmental conditions appear conducive for gradual development of this system once it moves over the Bay of Campeche in the southwestern Gulf of Mexico on Saturday.
- It could become a tropical depression over the southwestern Gulf this weekend while it moves slowly west northwestward or northwestward.

Former Tropical Storm Alberto

- Alberto, the first named tropical storm of the Atlantic hurricane season, has dissipated after being downgraded to a tropical depression, the National Hurricane Center in Miami announced Thursday evening.
- The storm dumped heavy rain and caused major flooding in parts of Mexico and Texas.
- Alberto was centered about 260 miles west of Tampico, Mexico, and 380 miles southwest of Brownsville, Texas, Thursday evening.
- The mayor of Corpus Christi, Texas, planned to request a disaster declaration after parts of the city were drenched with up to 6 inches of rain on Wednesday.

Disaster Activity DR-4795 New Mexico

- On June 20th, President Joseph R. Biden, Jr. declared that a major disaster exists in the State of New Mexico and ordered Federal aid to supplement State, tribal, and local recovery efforts in the areas affected by the South Fork Fire and Salt Fire beginning on June 17, 2024, and continuing.
- The President's action makes Federal funding available to affected individuals in Lincoln County and the Mescalero Apache Tribe.
- Damage assessments are continuing in other areas, and more counties and additional forms of assistance may be designated after the assessments are fully completed.
