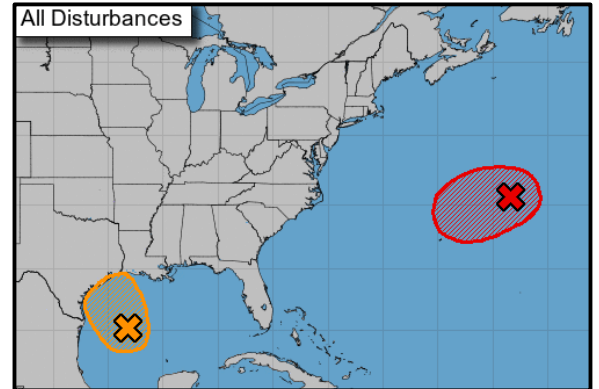

Tropical Activity

Atlantic – Disturbance 1

- Located 450 miles ENE of Bermuda
- Forecast to strengthen
- Formation chance through 48 hours – High (90%)
- Formation chance through 5 days – High (90%)

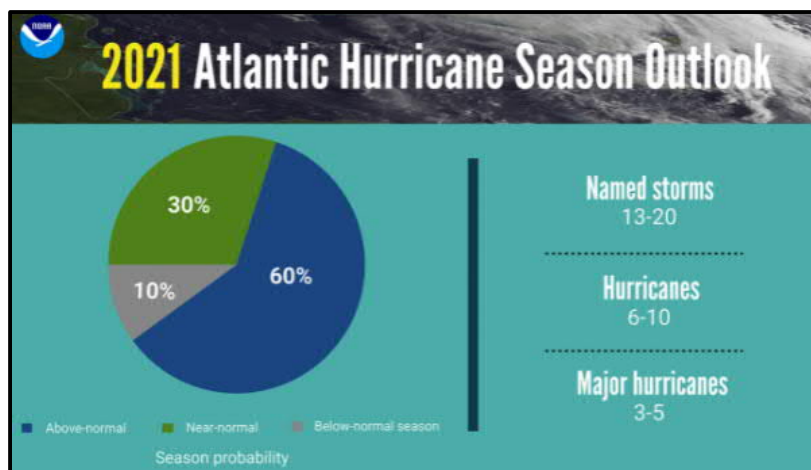


Atlantic – Disturbance 2

- Located over the western Gulf of Mexico
- Conditions are expected to be marginally conducive for some development before moving inland over the northwestern Gulf.
- Regardless of development, the system could produce heavy rainfall over portions of southeastern Texas and southwestern Louisiana during the next few days.
- Formation chance through 48 hours – Medium (40%)
- Formation chance through 5 days – Medium (40%)

2021 Atlantic Hurricane Season Outlook Update (NOAA)

- The 2021 Atlantic hurricane season is predicted to be more active than usual, according to an outlook released Thursday by NOAA's Climate Prediction Center.
- The NOAA outlook calls for 13 to 20 named storms, six to 10 hurricanes and three to five major hurricanes.
- NOAA's outlook agrees with The Weather Company, an IBM Business, which calls for 19 named storms, eight hurricanes and four major hurricanes.
- However, experts do not anticipate the historic level of storm activity seen in 2020.
- NOAA's outlook is for overall activity expected during the hurricane season and is not a landfall forecast. It will update the 2021 seasonal outlook in August prior to the historical peak of the Atlantic season.



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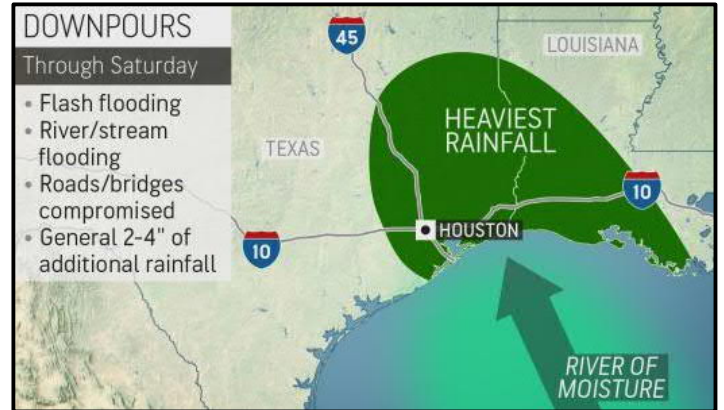
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Severe Weather & Flood Activity Louisiana

- Homeowners whose homes sustained damage due to this week's extreme flooding and severe storms are urged to report their damage through the Governor's Office of Homeland Security and Emergency Preparedness' (GOHSEP) online damage assessment.
- Since Monday, south Louisiana has been battered by torrential rainfall and deadly flash flooding that has already resulted in the deaths of five people. The weather has impacted hundreds of homes in the state, and more rain is expected over the next few days.
- In a statement Thursday, Gov. John Bel Edwards encouraged homeowners to report any damage to damage.la.gov by Tuesday, May 25.
- Nearly 900 residents have already reported damage since the severe weather began Monday.
- Two to 4 more inches could fall in the Lake Charles area through Friday, according to the National Weather Service.
- But some areas could get more than that — as much as 6 to 10 inches, Donald Jones, meteorologist for the weather service's Lake Charles office, said in a video briefing.
