
Northwest

- The third powerful atmospheric river storm to impact the Pacific Northwest since the end of last week blasted portions of Washington and Oregon.
- Hurricane-force wind gusts and torrential rain that led to widespread power outages, flooding and even Tornado Warnings.
- The multiday threat began over the weekend when the region was impacted by rain in the lower elevations.
- Monday another powerful storm swooped in and brought additional rounds of heavy rain and strong winds to cities like Seattle and Portland, Oregon.
- That storm, according to the FOX Forecast Center, will continue to impact the region through at least the first half of the day on Tuesday.
- Power outages have skyrocketed, with more than 160,000 outages reported in Washington and nearly 50,000 in Oregon, according to FindEnergy.com.

Disaster Activity

DR - 4860 Kentucky

 President Donald Trump on Monday approved expedited disaster assistance for individuals and local governments in 10 Kentucky counties after widespread flooding, said Gov. Andy Beshear.



- The counties are Breathitt, Clay, Harlan, Knott, Lee, Letcher, Martin, Owsley, Perry and Pike.
- The state was hit hard by flooding from a powerful storm that brought heavy rain and strong winds to the Southeast during the weekend of Feb. 14.
- The death toll from widespread flooding and extreme weather that battered Kentucky earlier this month has increased to 22, officials announced Monday.
- Nearly 90 Kentucky highways remain closed due to flooding, mud and rockslides, and the National Guard continues to clear debris in counties like Pike and Martin.
- The Kentucky River crested at 39.34 feet around 5 p.m. on Feb. 17. The river dropped below flood stage, which is 31 feet, on Friday afternoon. Levels are currently stable around 10 feet.
- Beshear said the widespread damage ranks among the state's worst natural disasters, including the eastern Kentucky floods in 2022 and western Kentucky tornadoes in 2021.
