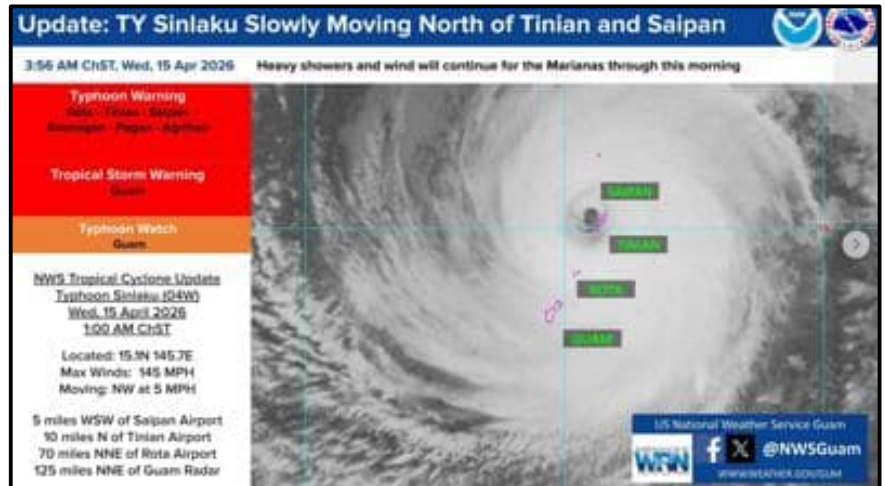

## Tropical Activity

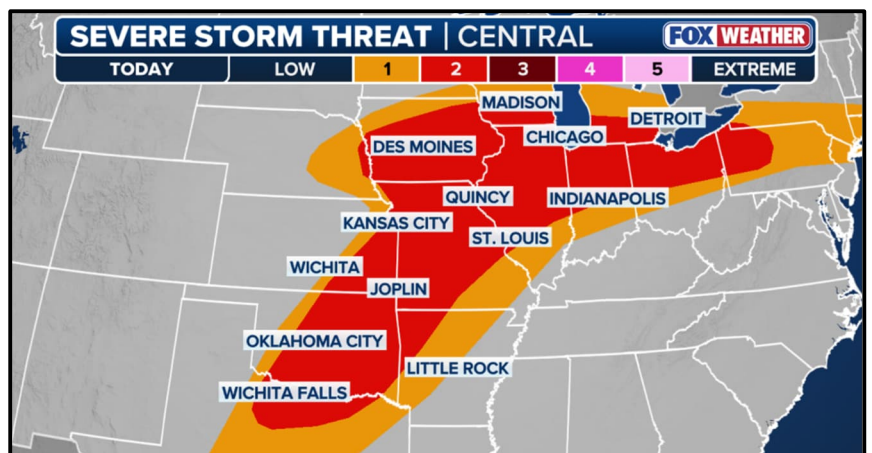
### Typhoon Sinlaku (CAT-3)

- Typhoon Sinlaku's eye made landfall on Saipan with gusts of 130 miles per hour, based on a 3:30 a.m. Wednesday post from the National Weather Service Guam, which also said that weather conditions will continue to worsen for both Saipan and Tinian.
- Sinlaku was downgraded from a super typhoon but remains a dangerous system, bringing wave heights up to 31.5 feet in Tanapag, Saipan and up to 26.41 feet in Ipan, Guam.
- Significant coastal inundation persists, and residents are strongly advised against going in the waters.
- Currently located 96 miles NW of Saipan with maximum sustained winds of 125 mph and moving NW at 6 mph.
- CNMI: Saipan: Dandan and Papago without water; services expected to be offline for Gualo Rai and Kannat Tabla areas; Tinian without water.
- Island-wide power outage in Saipan and Rota, and Tinian; all feeders are offline 4/15.
- Approximately 22 days for Saipan, 30 days for Tinian, and 22 days for Rota of diesel for power generation available.



## Severe Weather Outlook

- Over 130 million people across more than 12 states are bracing for another round of severe weather beginning Wednesday afternoon. This follows Tuesday's storms that produced tornadoes across southern Wisconsin and damaging wind gusts from Texas to New England.
- Wednesday's threat has shifted slightly east, but a broad Level 2 out of 5 risk of severe thunderstorms covers a corridor including parts of North Texas, the Southern Plains, the Midwest and the Ohio Valley, according to NOAA's Storm Prediction Center (SPC).



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- A Level 1 threat covers a wider area including the Dallas metro area and Texas Hill Country. To the north, the risk extends across parts of the Mid-Atlantic and Northeast, including northern New Jersey and New York City.
- Rounds of storms will once again develop over Iowa beginning Wednesday afternoon and charge east along a stalled front draped over southern Wisconsin and Michigan, where more than 70,000 customers were still without power early Wednesday after damage from Tuesday's storms.
- Supercell thunderstorms could begin to form across Missouri, Iowa, and western Illinois, with large hail being the main hazard. Flash flooding is once again possible across the region as storms repeatedly move over the same areas.

## Flood Activity

### Michigan

- Northern Michigan continues experiencing widespread river flooding from ongoing rainfall and snowmelt, resulting in roadway washouts, localized flooding of low-lying residential and commercial areas, and disruptions to transportation and infrastructure.
- The dangerously rising waters have prompted evacuations in some residential areas, triggered the failure of small dams, and has state and local officials closely monitoring larger dams near populated areas as high water threatens to overtop them and flood areas downstream.
- The Cheboygan Lock and Dam is of particular concern as rising water levels reduce the margin to overtopping. Currently water levels at the Cheboygan Dam are at 7.68 inches below crest.
- While impacts remain localized and manageable, flood risks are expected to increase over the next 24–72 hours, with the Cheboygan Lock and Dam representing the most significant escalation potential.
- A levee breach in Cheboygan County has led to evacuations along US-23.
- In Grand Traverse County, a state of emergency was declared Tuesday.
