

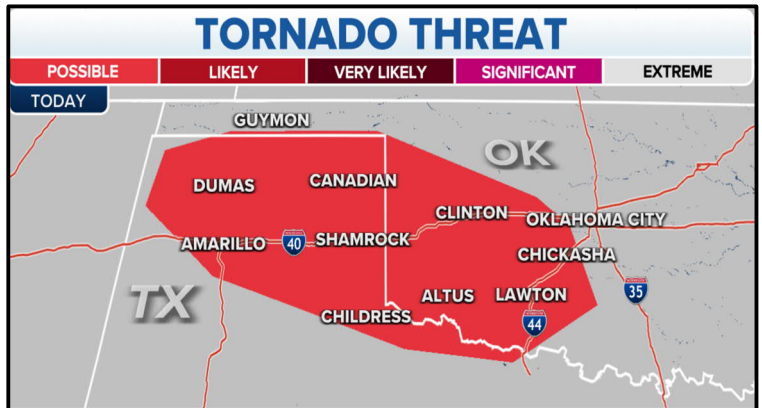

May 18, 2023

## Severe Weather Outlook

- A cold front traversing the country the rest of this week could bring with it the potential for heavy rain and severe thunderstorms.
- The strongest of Thursday's storms will be concentrated in the Upper Midwest and in parts of Oklahoma, Texas and New Mexico.
- The tornado threat will be centered mostly across north-central Oklahoma on Thursday.
- Flash flooding will also be a concern with storms that develop and produce heavy rain. The highest risk will be centered across southeastern Colorado and extreme northeastern New Mexico through central Kansas, western and central Oklahoma and the Texas Panhandle.
- Heading into Friday and the start of the weekend, the severe weather threat will be more widespread, with more than 17 million Americans under a Level 2 out of 5 risk of severe thunderstorms from central Texas into Arkansas and parts of the Mississippi Valley.



## Flood Activity

### Alaska

- On Sunday, Alaska Gov. Mike Dunleavy issued a disaster declaration after ice jams and snowmelt led to significant flooding in several communities along the Kuskokwim and Yukon rivers.
- The flooding started over the weekend and continued into this week as ice broke up on rivers and creeks and caused jams in some places, sending high water and chunks of ice into multiple Alaska communities.
- Along the Yukon River, the community of Eagle has reported two homes flooded. In the community of Circle, 15 homes flooded, and three or more homes have been pushed off their foundations.
- Along the Kuskokwim River, two to four homes were inundated in the community of Red Devil. In Crooked Creek, multiple homes flooded with four pushed off their foundations.
- The National Weather Service says, overall, the Yukon River prognosis is looking better as the breakup front moves downstream.
- On the lower Kuskokwim River in Southwest Alaska, a flood warning was in place for Kalskag through Thursday morning, said Mike Ottenweller, a weather service meteorologist. No major damage to buildings in Kalskag had been reported by late Wednesday morning, but floodwaters had been seen near parts of the airport.
- A flood watch remains in effect through Thursday evening for villages downriver of Kalskag, including Tuluksak, Akiachak, Kwethluk and Tuluksak.
