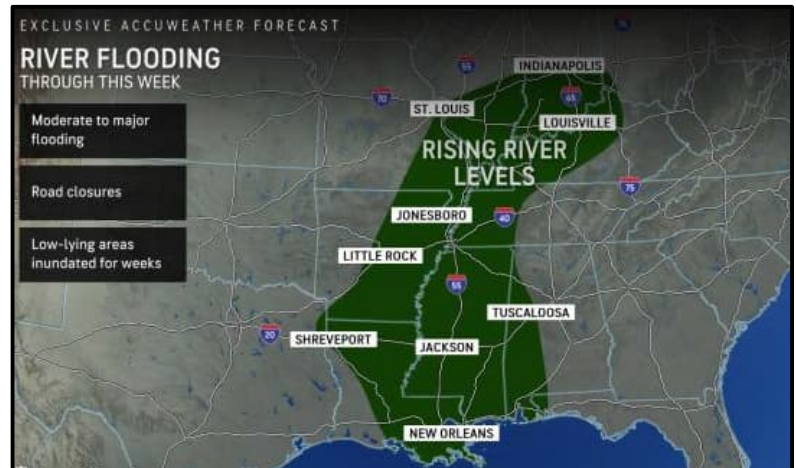

Severe Weather & Flooding Activity

- A deadly barrage of severe weather, tornadoes and torrential rain has come to an end, but the danger is far from over in communities across the Midwest and South as angry rivers continue to rise, forcing families from their homes.
- At least 24 people in seven states have been killed due to the severe weather or flooding, including children and first responders.
- President Donald Trump approved emergency disaster declarations for Arkansas, Tennessee and Kentucky, allowing the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to provide additional support for communities grappling with the scope of the historic disaster.
- Aerial assessments were conducted in Arkansas on April 7, and joint preliminary damage assessments (PDAs) began in Tennessee, with plans for Kentucky once conditions permit.



Kentucky

- Four people are dead after flooding in Kentucky, and hundreds of roads are closed across the state.
- The flooding has resulted in the closure of 538 state roads, more than half in western Kentucky, including Dawson Springs, which was hit hard by flooding. The state currently has 52 shelters open.
- Louisville Mayor Craig Greenberg said the Ohio River is expected to crest at more than 35 feet at the upper portion of the McAlpine Locks and Dam near the Falls of the Ohio by mid-week, rivaling levels last seen in 2018. The lower portion of the dam is expected to crest at 68 feet, which could pose threats to west and southwest Louisville, officials said.

Tennessee

- The National Weather Service has completed preliminary surveys of EF-3 damage in McNairy and Hardeman counties and EF-1 damage in Franklin, Hardin, Humphreys, Weakley, and Wilson counties. There are still many areas remaining to be surveyed.
- Flooding continues to be the biggest concern. There are many river systems that are seeing record breaking water levels, and these levels are expected to continue to rise until the rivers have crested.
- The National Weather Service has extended a flood warning for the Wolf River at Germantown, predicting minor flooding will persist until Friday afternoon.
- As of 7:45 PM CDT Monday, the river was at 22.7 feet, and it is forecast to rise to 23.7 feet by Thursday morning. The river is expected to fall below flood stage (20.5 feet) by late Friday morning.

- A State of Emergency and Mandatory Evacuation Order has been put in place for Bogota, Tennessee and the surrounding communities of Dyer County, officials said Monday.
- The Tennessee Department of Health has reported and confirmed 10 weather-related fatalities.

Arkansas

- Thousands of Arkansans remain without power Monday after several days of severe weather swept through the state, killing 2 people and injuring 13 others.
- River flooding is expected around much of Arkansas this week, with the National Weather Service reporting Monday morning that the Arkansas River could see moderate flooding Tuesday morning in Pendleton.
- Major flooding is expected Monday on the Black River in Black Rock, and is forecast for Corning on Tuesday and Wednesday, according to the weather service. The river is expected to experience moderate flooding throughout the week in Pocahontas and Tuesday through Friday in Black Rock.
- The Cache River is forecast to see major flooding Monday and Tuesday in Patterson and moderate flooding the other days, the weather service said.
- The Ouachita River in Camden is expected to see moderate flooding Tuesday through Friday and could see moderate flooding Friday at Thatcher Lock and Dam. The Saline River at Rye could see moderate flooding Friday, according to the weather service.
- The White River could see major to moderate flooding throughout the week. Batesville is expected to see major flooding Monday, Newport is expected to see flooding through Thursday, and Augusta is expected to see flooding Wednesday and Thursday.
- 76 highways with flooding impacts, primarily in Jackson County with impacts also in Independence and Mississippi Counties.
