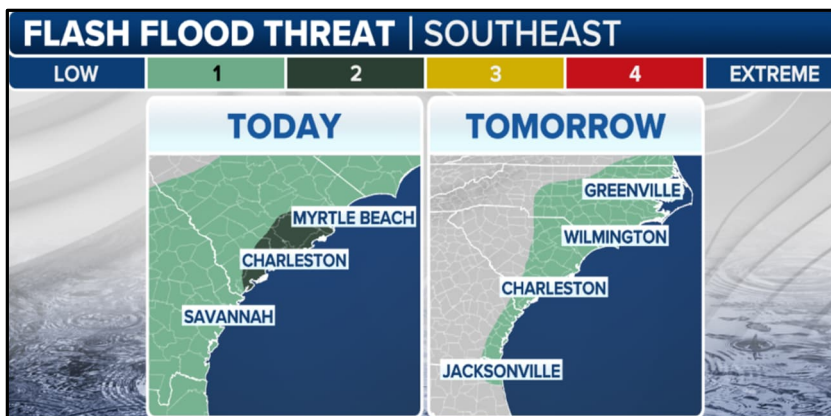
WSP USA INSPECTION SERVICES DISASTER AWARENESS REPORT

June 4, 2025

Flash Flood Threat

Southeast

- A low-pressure system is expected to bring heavy rain and possible flash flooding to the Southeast coast, including Georgia, South Carolina and North Carolina.
- An area of low pressure will begin to move up the Southeast coastline starting Wednesday afternoon.
- Dumping more than 6 inches of rain in South Florida, including Miami, between Monday and Tuesday.
- There is a low chance of development into a tropical depression or tropical storm over the next two days.
- The best chance for development appears to be during a small window on Thursday morning when the system moves off the Carolina coast, noted Merwin and FOX Weather Meteorologist Craig Herrera.
- While development chances are low, forecasters are asking coastal communities to remain on alert.
- Rain will arrive along the Georgia and South Carolina coasts beginning Wednesday afternoon.
- Spreading to the North Carolina coast on Wednesday night and into Thursday morning.
- At least 3 inches of rain is expected in the Charleston, South Carolina, and Wilmington, North Carolina.



Flooding Activity

Kansas

- Strong to severe thunderstorms swept through Central Kansas on Tuesday, triggering life-threatening flooding in and around eastern Wichita.
- The National Weather Service office issued a Flash Flood Emergency – the highest level of flood alert – for more than 200,000 residents after rainfall rates reached between 1-3 inches per hour.
- KVOE on Wednesday was reporting a long list of road closures in Lyon, Chase, Coffee and Osage counties.
- Within the Flash Flood Emergency zone, storm totals reached nearly 7 inches of rainfall.
- Kansas City received a record-breaking 2.46 inches of rain on Tuesday, smashing the previous daily rainfall record of 2.25 inches set in 2015.

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- First responders attended to nearly 100 calls for service which involved some type of assistance for people needing to reach higher ground.
- On June 3rd, Governor Laura Kelly issued a verbal state of disaster emergency proclamation for the state of Kansas due to heavy rainfall that has caused flooding.
