Tropical Activity Atlantic – Disturbance 1

- The National Hurricane Center (NHC) said a frontal boundary is expected to stall and weaken off the southeastern U.S. coast later this week, and an area of low pressure could then possibly develop by the weekend over the Atlantic waters, over Florida or the eastern Gulf.
- After that, the NHC said some gradual tropical or subtropical development could occur as the system slowly moves over the area.



- Several inches of rain could fall from the Cedar Key area southward through Sarasota, as well as in the Orlando area.
- Heavy rain is also likely to have an impact on holiday weekend plans on the Atlantic coast of Florida, from around the Daytona Beach area through Cocoa Beach and Melbourne on the Space Coast and into cities like West Palm Beach, Fort Lauderdale and Miami.

Severe Weather Outlook Northeast

- A sweeping cold front is moving into the Northeast making its way down to the Southeast coast this week.
- Along the way, it will be spawning numerous showers and thunderstorms, disrupting travel for millions.
- The front will eventually die along the Southeast coast, where it becomes more of a tropical threat down the line, the FOX Forecast Center said.



- The abundance of warm, humid air will likely lead to some stronger storms, with the highest severe storm threat centered New York to Washington, the FOX Forecast Center said.
- Damaging wind gusts in excess of 60 mph will be possible.
- Low-level moisture associated with this cold front could lead to flash flooding from Maine to North Carolina with highest threat for flooding centered over Baltimore and Washington.
- The FOX Forecast Center said the flash flood guidance in these areas shows that flooding can occur with only 1 inch of rain in an hour.



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Flash Flooding

Pennsylvania

- The National Weather Service office in State College, Pennsylvania, issued a rare Flash Flood Emergency warning of "life-threatening flash flooding" in northern Lancaster County and parts of Lebanon County just before 11 p.m.
- Severe storms brought heavy rain to the area Monday night through the early-morning hours of Tuesday.
- NWS reported that between 3 and 5 inches of rain has fallen since Monday, with at least 2 more inches of rain expected on Tuesday.
- Lancaster recorded 3.62 inches of rain on Monday, making it the city's 10th-wettest day on record and its eighth-wettest June day.
- The State Department of Transportation reported that a downed tree was blocking part of State Route 30 in Lancaster County.
- Flooding closed part of State Route 72 near Cornwall, some 27 miles east of Harrisburg, early Tuesday morning.
- Another round of severe weather is expected later Tuesday.
