Flood Activity

California

- A state of emergency was issued Sunday by Gov. Gavin Newsom's office for Southern California counties in the path of a powerful storm that will bring steady rain into Monday.
- Counties under the state of emergency are Los Angeles, Orange, Riverside, San Bernardino, San Diego, San Luis Obispo, Santa Barbara and Ventura counties.
- The storm powered by an atmospheric river over the Pacific Ocean is drawing in a significant amount of moisture as it enters Southern California.
- Some 38 million people are covered by flood alerts due to a weather system the National Weather Service said could be "potentially historic."
- Flood watches and warnings are in effect for some areas. Communities near burn scars and flood- and slide-prone areas are under evacuation warnings and orders.
- High wind warnings and coastal flood advisories were in effect for the LA and Ventura County coasts. A less severe wind advisory was in effect for inland LA County and downtown Los Angeles.
- Los Angeles will bear the brunt of the storm early Monday, but the threat will shift to the San Diego area by Monday evening.
- Nearly 5.5 inches of rain fell in Los Angeles on Sunday into early Monday. The National Weather Service expected another 1-2 inches of rain to fall on the city on Monday.
- The National Weather Service said some areas could end up with 8-14 inches of rain over a multi-day period in California.
- Mandatory evacuations by county:
 - Los Angeles: 140
 - Monterey: 1,590
 - Santa Barbara: 1,250
 - Ventura: 180
- Over 530,000 customers are without power as of early Monday.
- Multiple road closures reported.
- Three fatalities reported.
- Five shelters open with 77 occupants.





Earthquake Activity Oklahoma

- The U.S. Geological Survey (USGS) reported that an earthquake with a preliminary magnitude of 5.1 was recorded about five miles northwest of Prague at 11:24 p.m. Friday. The depth of the quake was about three miles, according to the USGS.
- Seven aftershocks had been recorded by Saturday morning, including a 3.5 that occurred around 12:30 a.m. and a 3.2 at 3:16 a.m.
- According to a statement from the Oklahoma Geological Survey released Saturday morning: "There were reports of strong shaking in the immediate area and it was widely reported as being felt statewide, including the Oklahoma City and Tulsa metro areas. We should expect several strong aftershocks in the coming weeks that may be widely felt ... The seismic hazard remains high in the area."
- The quake was the first of more than a 5-point magnitude in Oklahoma since 2016.
